COMMON TYPES OF PARKING VIOLATIONS

72 . 05 PARKING IN ALLEYS, ON LAWNS, BETWEEN SIDEWALKS & CURBS

(A) It shall be unlawful for any person to park or leave standing any automobile, truck, trailer, tractor or any other vehicle, within any alley in the City, except for the purposes of loading or unloading.

(B) It shall be unlawful for any person to park or leave standing any automobile, truck, trailer tractor or any other vehicle, at, on or within any lawn, sidewalk or the space between the sidewalk and curb and gutter in or on any street in the City; provided, however, where there is no clearly defined curb and the paved portion of the street and sidewalk extends to the building wall, there shall be a passageway of at least five feet left between the vehicle and the building wall.



72 . 07 PARKING OF HOUSE TRAILERS & MOTORIZED HOMES.

No person shall park a house trailer or motorized house cruiser on any of the streets in the City with an overall length of 20 feet or more.

98 . 03 ABANDONED/JUNKED VEHICLES

It shall be unlawful for any person to store or allow to remain in the open public or private property within the corporate limits of the City, any disassembled, or inoperable and/or unlicensed, or any junked, wrecked or abandoned motor vehicle for a period of three or more days or for a period of five or more days on private property, unless in connection with an automotive located in a properly zoned area.

72 . 06 PARKING RESTRICTED

(1) No person shall stop, stand or park a truck on any street, other than for the expeditious loading or unloading of freight, for more than one hour, except in cases of emergency when the truck is broken down and unable to move, and except also in the event a moving van is loading or unloading the furniture and household goods, or the furniture and equipment and goods, wares and merchandise of a business in either of which events the operator of the truck will have a reasonable time in which to move his or her truck.

(2) No boats, trailers, campers, RV or other like recreational vehicles shall be allowed to be parked on City streets.

Commercial vehicles in residential areas—trucks in excess of 22 feet in length or nine feet in height, vehicular machinery, semi-tractor or trailers or similar vehicles are prohibited from parking on local streets or in residential areas.

NEGATIVE IMPACTS OF IMPROPER PARKING

- Environmental Factors (ex: air conditioner refrigerant, gas, motor oil, etc. can contaminate the ground or soil)
- Reduces amount of green space, creates ruts, causes mud, curb and/or sidewalk damage.



- May lower property values over time, and is dangerous for children and pets.
- May reduce traffic capacity and cause delays.

FAQ'S ABOUT CITATION

Q: Can I move my vehicle, so it will not be towed?

A: Yes, vehicles in violation may be relocated to a garage or to storage. Do not relocate your vehicle in violation to another public area or to your driveway/yard as this does not properly address violation(s).

Q: I plan to remediate the violation(s), but I am not able to do that within time period noted. What can I do to prevent my vehicle from being towed?

A: Immediately contact issuing agency to discuss the situation. Failure to do so within a minimum of 48-hours in advance of your Notice/Order tow deadline, will result in the City removing your vehicle.

Q: What is an open public location?

A: An open public location is any area accessible to the public such as a street, alley, right-of-way, sidewalk, etc.

Q: What is a private location?

A: A private location is any area on

private property viewable by the public such as a driveway or yard.

Q: My Notice/Order is for multiple violations. What if I cannot remediate all of them by the tow deadline? For example, I can put air in my tires, but I cannot plate it.

A: ALL issues must be remediated to prevent your vehicle from being towed.

Q: Are there other methods for addressing the violation(s) set forth in the Notice/Order if I am unable to remediate all violation(s)?

A: In order for your vehicle not to be towed; if you are unable to remediate violation(s), you must: a) remove it from the open public and/or private location within the time period specified on Notice/Order; and b) refrain from placing it in any location that is an open public and/or private area. For example, you may relocate a vehicle in violation to a garage, storage facility, etc. You may not relocate a vehicle in violation to an alley, driveway, side/back yard, etc.
